About IBC

Brief History

International Blue Crescent Relief and Development Foundation (IBC) was founded to improve the lives of the most disadvantaged areas of the world's population regardless of nationality, ethnicity, religion, belief, language, political opinion, gender, age, sexual orientation, genetics, or physical characteristics. The Foundation started its activities in 1999 in cooperation with the United Nations World Food Program in Albania by establishing bakeries in refugee camps hosting thousands of Kosovars. In May 2000 IBC headquarters were officially founded in Türkiye with registration number 4820.

IBC has been providing emergency relief, health, education, and rehabilitation support at local, national, and international levels for over 24 years. A Special Consultant on the UN Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) and a member of the International Community of Volunteer Associations (ICVA), the IBC works in collaboration with local and national authorities, other CSOs, global donors, universities and research centers in all of its projects by leveraging their resources, technical expertise and experience in its own way of working.

IBC has implemented projects in over 28 countries and its current projects portfolio spans 14 countries including Türkiye, Syria, Afghanistan, Yemen, Burkina Faso, Niger, Chad, Ukraine, Morocco, Libya, Palestine, Moldova, Sudan and Pakistan with projects focusing on education, psychosocial support, water sanitation and hygiene, emergency food relief, legal counseling and human rights, combatting gender-based violence, capacity building and mentoring civil society organizations, protection, emergency shelter relief, winterization, basic needs support, social cohesion, and health- especially vaccination, medical supplies and advocacy for vaccination to prevent infectious diseases. IBC regularly participates in local and regional coordination meetings, is active in the cluster system in multiple countries, and supports staff to lead and take part in professional development in line with internationally recognized humanitarian and development standards committed to improving the lives of our communities.

IBC Country Missions



Afghanistan

IBC has been providing emergency relief, Food and winterizations support to Afghan IDPs in Afghanistan since 2015. IBC projects in Afghanistan are:

Food Security and NFI:

Since 2015, IBC in partnership with IDRF Canada has completed more than ten food and non-food items parcel distributions in Kunduz, Herat, and Mazar-e-Sharif provinces of Afghanistan. During Ramadan months of years IBC distributed food packages in mentioned areas. IBC also distributed Qurbani meat in Qurban Eid days.

Emergency Relief Response:

Since 2015, IBC in partnership with IDRF Canada has been providing emergency relief projects in natural disasters in Loghar, Takhar, Kabul, Herat, Mazar-e-Sharif, Balkh and Kunduz provinces in Afghanistan. The emergency relief projects are food parcel, hot meals, hygiene kits, tents, and non-food items (NFI) packages for IDPs in Afghanistan.

Winterization:

IBC has increased efforts on year-round advocating for winter preparations and timely support to families to survive the cold temperatures and harsh conditions that come with winter. Many of the families in the regions where IBC works are internally displaced and do not have proper shelter. To make matters worse, the collapse of the economy has resulted in unaffordable essentials such as fuel and warm clothes. IBC, in collaboration IDRF Canada has provided winterization packs for families includig warm clothes, boots, socks, underwear, hats, scarves, jackets, and in a few cases-access to fuel.

Vocational & Educational Community Center (VECC):

IBC has taken action together with IDRF Canada in the region to reintegrate women who have lost their legal and social rights due to the regime change in Afghanistan. Tailoring and carpentry trainings were provided at the Vocational & Educational Community Center (VECC) established in the city of Mazar-i-Sharif with the aim of providing employment and supporting women who had to move away from education. The radical change in the country has also been a hope for male citizens who lost their professions. The beneficiaries who benefited from the carpentry training given at the VECC have thus acquired a new profession.







Lebanon

Since October 2024, IBC has been providing emergency relief, food and hygiene support to Lebanese families and IDPs. IBC's projects in Lebanon are:

Food Security:

The conflict between Israel and Hezbollah has led to a growing economic crisis in Lebanon. In the last quarter of 2024, almost half of the Lebanese population (44 percent), which was struggling to survive even before the war, is below the hunger line and faces food insecurity. According to a new World Bank report released in mid-2024, poverty in Lebanon has more than tripled in the last decade, reaching 44 percent of the total population. The report points out that the protracted economic and financial crisis has compelled households to adopt a variety of coping strategies, including cutting back on food consumption and non-food expenses, as well as reducing health expenditures, with likely severe long-term consequences. IBC, with support from IDRF Canada, distributes food parcels and provides ready-to-eat meals to displaced persons forced to flee their homes due to war.

WASH:

The humanitarian situation in Lebanon is dire, with a convergence of economic, social, and health challenges. The effects of the war in Gaza, which has been going on for more than a year, have put Lebanon, already in the grip of a political, financial and socio-economic crisis, in an even more difficult situation. In addition to the Lebanese people who have been forced to leave their homes and migrate within the country, the number of people in need, including Syrians, Palestinians and migrants from other countries, is increasing. This situation has reached a scale that the state's existing capacity cannot cope with and has significantly affected access to water and sanitation services. Closely following the developments in Lebanon, IBC, together with IDRF Canada, is distributing hygiene kits to hundreds of DPIs and families who have to flee tehir home in order to prevent health problems that may arise from limited access to water and hygiene.

Libya

Since 2023, IBC has been providing health, WASH, food, emergency relief and winterization support to Libyan families ve IDP's. IBC projects in Libya are:

Food Security and NFI:

In the last quarter of 2023, floods in Libya resulted in the death, injury and disappearance of thousands of people. The city of Derna suffered great damage due to the flood. IBC, in collaboration IDRF Canada, Islamic Help UK, Action Medeor, Aktion Deutschland Hilft, Lions Club International and local partner STACO, distributed hot meals, food packages and non-food items. IBC distributed food packages during Ramadan.

Emergency Relief Response:

Since September 2023, IBC, with the support of IDRF Canada, Action Medeor, Aktion Deutschland Hilft, Lions Club International and local partner STACO, has been responding to the floods in Libya, which caused the collapse of infrastructure and transport systems and disruption of health services. The emergency relief projects consist of hot meals, blankets, tarpaulins, baby food, drinking water, nappies, non-food items (NFIs), winter clothes, hygiene and first aid kits for displaced people whose homes have become uninhabitable due to floods.

Hot Meal Distribution:

IBC has been working in Libya since the beginning of the crisis and has been responding to urgent humanitarian needs on the ground. IBC has been operational in many provinces in Libya and provides humanitarian relief to those most in need and has developed a well-established presence in the region.

This project addressed the provision of hot meals following severe floods by distributing good quality food to thousands of families in Bab Tubruk and the Eastern coast in Derna and the surrounding area. The project strengthened nutrition capacity. This project met the needs of many people.







Morocco

Since 2023, IBC has been providing health, WASH, food, emergency relief and winterized support to Moroccan families. IBC projects in Morocco are:

Food Security and NFI:

Since October 2023, IBC, in partnership with IDRF Canada, Action Medeor, Islamic Help UK, Corus, Good Neighbors, Episcopal Relief and Development, Penny Appeal, Zaimah and local partner Al Amal, has distributed food and non-food items in many hard-to-reach villages in Morocco. IBC distributed food packages during Ramadan, especially in the new year, and sacrificial meat during Eid al-Adha.

Emergency Relief Response:

Since the last quarter of 2023, IBC has been carrying out emergency relief projects in the earthquake-affected cities and villages of Morocco. The emergency relief projects consist of tents, hygiene kits, food parcel, non-food items (NFI), baby care kits, medical equipment and first aid kits for people who lost their homes due to the earthquake.

Winterization & WASH:

Throughout the year, IBC continued to work with IDRF Canada, Corus, Action Medeor, Episcopal Relief and Development, Zaimah and its local partner Al Amal to help earthquake survivors survive the harsh winter weather. Families whose homes were destroyed or damaged beyond repair by the earthquake were provided shelter, primarily in the form of winter clothes, heaters, blankets, mattresses and tents. In addition, IBC, together with Action Medeor and its local partner Al Amal, also provided mobile sanitation support in order to provide hygienic conditions for earthquake-affected families.

Culinary Training For Women:

Aware of the fact that strong women build powerful societies, IBC, together with IDRF Canada and its local partner Al Amal, has implemented the Culinary Training for Women Project with the aim of bringing women living in the El Haouz region of Marrakech city, whose right to education is restricted due to various reasons and who are subjected to physical and psychological violence, into working life. During the 9-month training, English and French lessons will be given to the beneficiaries who will be prepared for professional working life.







Palestine

IBC has been providing health, food, WASH, emergency relief and winterization support to citizens of Gazans and West Bank since 2023. IBC projects in Gaza are:

Emergency Relief Response:

Closely following the developments in the region since the first day of the conflict, IBC continues to work actively in the region with in collaboration IDRF Canada and Americares. Emergency relief projects include hygiene packages, food packages, dignity kits and Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS) for thousands of people who have lost their homes or had to relocate within the country due to the ongoing conflict. IBC distributed food packages during Ramadan and meat during Eid al-Adha.

Food Security & WASH:

Since the first day of the conflict, IBC has continued to support the citizens of Gaza and the West Bank, who have difficulty in accessing food, together with IDRF Canada, and has continued to work selflessly to provide food to thousands of people. With the support of IDRF Canada, IBC distributed food packages to thousands of beneficiaries. IBC continued to distribute food packages during Ramadan and also distributed meat during Eid al-Adha. On the one hand, the inoperability of hospital generators due to lack of fuel disrupted the health sector. Considering these developments that caused hygiene problems, IBC, together with IDRF Canada, distributed hygiene kits and dignity kits to thousands of people.

Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS):

The severe loss of life due to continuous and intensive bombardments, missing relatives, loss of livelihoods, etc. cause shocks and traumas. For this reason, it is of great importance to protect the psychological and mental health of innocent civilians who survive and try to hold on to life again. The Mental Health and Psycho-Social Support (MHPSS) project, implemented in cooperation with IBC and Americares, aims to improve the daily lives of conflict-affected civilians and to increase their resilience by strengthening the availability, accessibility and quality of mental health services.







Sahel: Burkina Faso, Chad, Niger

IBC has been operating in Sahel Africa since 2011. IBC has totally reached more than 10k people with protection services, food, water, medication, shelter materials and other life-critical items. IBC projects in Burkina Faso, Chad, and Niger are:

Food Security:

IBC, in partnership with IDRF Canada, has been distributing monthly food packages in Chad, Burkina Faso and Niger since 2011 in line with the basic needs identified. It continues to distribute food packages during Ramadan and meat during Eid al-Adha every year.

Emergency Relief Response:

Since 2011, IBC, with the support of UMCOR and IDRF Canada, has carried out emergency relief projects in Mali and Somalia during natural disasters. The emergency relief projects consist of food parcel, hygiene kits, tents and NFI packages for displaced persons in the region. The countries of Burkina Faso, Chad and Niger in Sahel Africa are in the grip of a serious food crisis. IBC is also closely involved in these countries where humanitarian living conditions are getting more difficult day by day. With the support of IDRF Canada, IBC continues to distribute monthly food packages, food packages during Ramadan and meat during Eid al-Adha in these countries.

Water Wells:

Humanitarian needs across Chad, Burkina Faso and Niger remain high across virtually all key sectors. Lack of stability and widespread violence and insecurity is resulting in large population displacements across a number of countries in West Africa. This project will focus on improving access to clean and potable water for households most in need. In Burkina Faso, Chad and Niger, the lack of access to clean and potable water has a negative impact on agricultural activities, trade and health problems. Within the scope of this project, it is aimed to eliminate the problems experienced in access to water, which is one of the basic human needs.







Sudan

IBC has been providing food emergency relief support to Sudanese families and IDP's since 2021. IBC projects in Sudan are:

Emergency Food Response:

Severe floods and civil unrest in Sudan have left thousands of people without access to basic necessities. The civil war in Sudan is making the living conditions of the people more difficult every day. One of the most important problems of Sudanese people in need of humanitarian assistance is the lack of access to food... People need assistance under many headings, including health, shelter, water, sanitation and hygiene. According to data released by the UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) in its Global Humanitarian Overview 2024, approximately 300 million people around the world are in need of assistance due to conflicts, climate change and various reasons. The report states that the same will be true for 74.1 million people in Eastern and Southern Africa next year.

The crisis in Sudan accounts for almost 40 percent of this figure. However, in the same report, it is underlined that due to the conflict that has erupted since August 2023, the needs to be met in Sudan are increasing and the number of people to be helped will increase to 30 million in 2024. The ongoing conflict since last April is making the situation even more severe. More than 8.2 million people have been forced to flee their homes and more than 6.5 million internally displaced people are struggling to survive in the grip of hunger. Closely following the developments in Sudan, IBC, in collaboration IDRF Canada, took action to find solutions to the food problem of the Sudanese people who are struggling to survive in the grip of hunger. It distributed food packages during Ramadan and meat during Eid al-Adha to over a thousand families who had to flee to the outskirts and villages of Khartoum due to the ongoing conflict.







Yemen

IBC has been providing health, WASH, food, emergency relief, and winterizations support to Yemeni families in Yemen since 2018. IBC projects in Yemen are:

Food Security:

Since November 2018, IBC has provided food for over the thousands of people in Qurbani meat and distributed Ramadan packages to the families. Families are identified in need in the camps in the city of Mukalla, the capital of Hadramud Province and in the Lahij near the Province of Aden.

Water Wells & Interim Water Trucking:

IBC continues to implement WASH projects were scaled according to the number of beneficiaries in the area where the water wells were drilled, including 78 water wells (7 solar assisted) in Hadramud and Abyan Region and water trucks completed to camps in Abyan, Aden, Al Mansoura, Khur Maksar, Al-Shaikh Outman, Zinjabar and Hadramout.

Covid-19 Relief & Nurses Training in Mukalla:

Since June 2020, IBC, in coordination with the Ministry of Health in Mukalla and with the support of the Yemeni Red Crescent and IDRF Canada and Action Medeor of Germany, has provided medication, Covid relief and capacity building trainings for a cohort of nurses for the duration of the established programme.

In addition, IBC provided integrated health and nutrition services to people in the region through a mobile clinic, ensuring that they have access to basic and vital health services and have the chance to regain their dignity and rebuild their lives in Hadramud, Abyan and Aden. Continuing its activities in this area year after year, IBC also aims to address the critical workforce shortage in intensive care and respiratory care units through specialised medical training for nurse practitioners. The nurse practitioners who will benefit from the training through this project will receive Respiratory Therapy training during the project period.







Syria (NWS)

IBC has been carrying out a comprehensive range of relief and development activities to improve the harsh living conditions caused by the 13-year humanitarian crisis in Syria, and this crisis has deeply affected the lives of millions of people. IBC operates in key areas such as food, health, shelter, education, social cohesion, and protection to meet urgent needs. IBC projects in Syria are:

Food Security:

IBC provides support to areas without access to food under appropriate hygiene and distribution conditions as defined by the World Health Organisation (WHO). In particular, regular food packages and hot meals are distributed in camps in Afrin, Azaz, Al-Bab, Marea, Al-Rai, Jarabulus, Ras al-Ayn, Tal Abyad and Idlib. In addition, bread bakeries are established in the region and sacrificial meat is distributed during Eid al-Adha and food packages are distributed during Ramadan. In 2023, IBC provided support to twenty thousand beneficiaries and internally displaced persons (IDPs) living in camps.

Winterization:

Winter is harsh in some geographies... Every year, the winter season renews the pain of thousands of families who were internally displaced during the conflicts and fled to safe areas, struggling to survive in tent camps. Especially in Afrin Region, hundreds of tents that are the living spaces of refugees are flooded with heavy rains, while education and training activities in the region are also disrupted. IBC that has been providing support to the border camps, which have become the center of the tragedy since the first days of the crisis, makes its relief activities more comprehensive, especially in winter months. IBC regularly conducts needs assessments in the region, replaces tents that have become unusable due to cold weather conditions, and provides heating support.

IBC continues to develop projects to address the shelter problem in Northern Syria. IBC has established tent cities for displaced people in the region and provided them with necessities such as blankets, mattresses, lighting, heating, and insulators. In addition, IBC has also started the construction of multi-storey permanent buildings and a community center in the crisis zone, in accordance with the framework stipulated by the Public Administration. Preparations are nearing completion for the launch in 2024 of a living space for 400 people, including a community center.

WASH:

water networks, and provided hygiene packs for people living in camps. It also completed a water subsidy project in the Afrin area of Rajo, covering all electricity costs to pump water to the city of Rajo and ten surrounding villages. In 2023, after the earthquake in Soran City, IBC built a water tank with a capacity of 100 cubic meters and rehabilitated another water tank with a capacity of 50 cubic meters that was damaged by the earthquake. It also completed a solar panel project to pump water to Soran City. With this project, IBC supported 35000 people daily. In addition, in response to the earthquake that hit Syria on 6 February 2023, IBC constructed 25 latrines, sewerage lines, and laundry rooms in Eyvaa and Al Okhwa camps in Azaz.

Health:

IBC was the first foundation to establish a hospital at the Bab El-Seleme crossing point on the Syrian side, next to Bab El-Seleme camp. This hospital, which was the largest health center serving the region, was later transferred to a local foundation and is known as the IBC Hospital to this day. Following Operation Euphrates Shield in 2016, Türkiye started the construction of large hospitals to meet the medical needs in the region. These include Marea Hospital, Al-Ra'i Hospital, Al-Bab Hospital, Jarablus Hospital and then Azaz Hospital.

In 2016, Türkiye started building large hospitals to meet the medical needs in the region. IBC regularly supported these hospitals with medical equipment and consumables. During this period, approximately 13 containers of medical supplies were provided. The city of Dabiq is located in northwestern Syria and is administratively subordinate to Aleppo Governorate and Azaz region. Our team provides services to residents of Dabiq city, refugees, IDPs, and camp residents in the city and surrounding villages. In 2022, the mobile clinic started providing services in five locations in Al-Bab. In addition to general health services, health support is also provided for children and the elderly.

Mental Health and Psychosocial Support Services (MHPSS):

IBC has established a dedicated team to scale up psychosocial support services for war victims affected by the crisis in Syria, particularly in 5 camps in the Al-Bab area. This psychosocial support work aims to help people living in the camps cope with their traumatic experiences and regain their emotional well-being. In addition, the International Blue Crescent Foundation has established a community center for refugee groups migrating to Kilis and has provided regular support to its beneficiaries since the beginning of the crisis. Here too, a variety of support services are offered, including group therapy, individual counseling and support groups. IBC also provides a mobile reproductive health clinic, physical therapy center, dental clinic and ambulance service in the region.







Ukraine & Moldova

IBC has been operating in Moldova and Ukraine since the beginning of the crisis by end of February 2022 and has reached more than 5000 people with protection services, food, water, medication, shelter materials and other life-critical items. IBC projects in Ukraine and Moldova include:

Providing Medical Equipment:

Since March 2022, IBC continues to support Ukraine and Moldova with great dedication in collaboration IDRF Canada, UMCOR, Global Giving and Action Medeor. In coordination with the Ministry of Health of Komrat and Kongaz, IBC provided medical equipment and medicines to Komrat and Kongaz State Hospitals in Moldova. IBC has provided medical supplies to 3 regional hospitals in Bolgrad, Artsiz and Tarutyne, medical supplies to the Ukrainian cities of Odessa and Mykolaiv, as well as sent three ambulances to help state hospitals in Comrat, Vulkanesh and Moldova to meet the health needs caused by the influx of people from eastern Ukraine.

In addition, IBC delivered two containers of medical equipment and medicines to the Komrat State Hospital in Moldova. IBC, however, continues its assistance to Ukraine and Moldova selflessly. It provided medical equipment and supplies to 2 border hospitals in Gagauzia, as well as ambulance and medical equipment support to Comrat State Hospital and health units in Gagauzia.

Food Security:

IBC is in daily contact and cooperation with the local authorities and coordinate with Comrat Mayors in implementation of our activities in Moldova. IBC has monthly food distribution to Ukrainian families in need since March 2022. Food distribution projects are being done to 3000 families in Comrat areas to Oblast. and has plan to continue this project until end of this year 2022. IBC provided ready to eat meals for people at border crossings in Izmail city of Ukraine, food rations for IDPs in Odessa Oblast. IBC continues to provide support in Ukraine and Moldova.

In addition to cash assistance and food parcel distribution, IBC has established a bakery in the city centre of Mykolaiv, which distributes 4,000 pieces of hot bread every day to the war-affected population near Mykolaiv and Kherson. In addition, a community centre with an area of 200 square metres was built in Mykolaiv city centre and opened to the use of the war-affected population. In addition to food distribution, the centre also provides phone charging units and internet access. IBC distributes food parcels to 1,000 war victims per month, as well as more than 50,000 ready-to-eat meals per month in Kherson Oblast and food parcels to 1,000 displaced persons in Bolhrad region.

WASH:

From the beginning of the war, Ukrainian citizens faced shortages in many basic needs such as food, health care and housing, but the most important of these was access to clean water. The destruction of the Nova Kakhovka hydroelectric dam in an attack collapsed the city's network and caused problems in access to drinking water. IBC, together with its donor Action Medeor, took action in July 2023 to distribute water to the city of Kherson. For those who do not have access to clean water in Kherson, it is aimed to establish 2,5 and 10 cubic metre water tanks that are filled daily and to provide water at 20 different points by creating a source for these tanks.

Health:

IBC, which closely monitors the disruptions in health services during the ongoing conflicts and offers solutions at this point, has taken important steps to ensure the continuity of aid. In this context, a new family medicine polyclinic was opened in Tarutino village of the Bolhrad district of Odessa region. The polyclinic will provide medical services to both local residents and hundreds of displaced persons who were forced to move to this region from the frontline and occupied territories of Ukraine. Moreover, together with its partner, the German charity Action Medeor, Blue Crescent Ukraine has provided the polyclinic with the necessary equipment it needs.

Winterization:

IBC continues to work selflessly to ensure that the people of Ukraine and Moldova are not affected by the harsh winter conditions. In Odessa Oblast, a shelter for displaced persons and an elderly care centre were supported with food, generators, firewood, textile materials. In Moldova, in December 2023, UNHCR's regional operational partner distributed winter relief items to 750 refugees. In addition, 50 stoves were distributed in Bolhrad and 150 in the eastern towns of Mykolaiv Oblast. It also distributed 50 tonnes of fuel kits in Bolhrad and 350 tonnes in eastern towns of Mykolaiv Oblast, as well as 2,000 wool blankets and mattresses in towns in Oblast.
